Urban Room Folkestone (URF) is a physical space where people can go to understand, debate and get involved in the past, present and future of where they live, work and play. Part of the nationwide Urban Rooms Network, URF seeks to foster meaningful connections between people and place, using creative methods of engagement to encourage active participation in the future of our buildings, streets and neighbourhoods.

Folkestone Fringe is an organisation that was formed in response to the inaugural Folkestone Triennial in 2008 and aimed to take advantage of the international focus on the 14 week exhibition to raise the profile of artists living locally as well as visiting artists in relation to this wider regional and national audience. Since then we have been continuing on this mission to drive cultural change in the town and are proud to be a reference point for creativity within the community through our regular festivals and events that run throughout the year.

About MagiC Carpets

A four-year project led by Kaunas Biennial and funded by Creative Europe. The platform unites 15 cultural organisations, from the European Union and candidate countries, who are committed to working with emerging artists and curators by supporting them to develop new projects together. These projects are made in response to local situations and with local people.

The projects are designed to reveal local knowledge and hidden stories as a way to create a greater connection between people and place. For the third year of the project, Folkestone Fringe, in partnership with <u>Urban Room Folkestone</u> and its Festival of Looking, are working with <u>Mary Conroy</u>, nominated by <u>EVA International</u>, Ireland, and local artists <u>Craig Gell</u>, <u>Aida Silvestri</u>, <u>Leah Thorn</u>, <u>Lee Desai</u> and <u>Nico Dunsbee</u>. The outcomes of their projects will be presented here alongside a series of related projects.

We are so excited to be presenting a Festival programme, especially in these uncertain times. We need now, more than ever, to feel connected and part of a community. This programme is a collaborative effort that has been brought together by a shared need to question, explore and navigate the situations in which we currently find ourselves as well as celebrate the importance and power of expression and creativity.
